



During the Birmingham City Council Meeting on May 29th, 2018, the City Council voted on the following items:

1. *An Ordinance "TO FURTHER AMEND THE ZONING DISTRICT MAP OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM" (Case No. ZAC2018-00004) to change zone district boundaries from CO&I, Contingency Office and Institutional District to QB-1, Qualified Neighborhood Business District, filed by owner Krystal Rumph, for the property located at 1115 27th Street North situated in the NE¼ of Section 25, Township 17-S, Range 3-West. Birmingham, and the hearing of all interested parties.*

Was this item approved? Yes

What does this mean? After a public hearing, the City Council voted to approve a change in zone district boundaries from CO&I, Contingency Office and Institutional District to B-1, Neighborhood Business District for the adaptive reuse of existing structure for a private fitness studio, filed by owner, Krystal Rumph.

The City's Long Range Land Use Plan identifies the property as Mixed- Use Medium, a land use designation most comparable to the existing zoning district, therefore, the rezoning request is Consistent with the Plan.

The applicant met with The Planning and Zoning Committee of The Norwood Neighborhood Association on March 17, 2018 at the subject property. The Committee had no concerns made a recommendation to The Norwood Neighborhood Association to approve the rezoning request. On March 24, 2018, The Norwood Neighborhood Association voted to Recommend Approval of the proposed rezoning request. The vote was 11 abstained and 1 denied.

2. An Ordinance to amend Title 2, "General Government", Chapter 5, "Boards, Commissions and Committees", of the General Code of the City of Birmingham, Article E, "Birmingham Library Board", Section 72 "Membership; term; election; vacancies," to reduce the size of the Board from 10 members to 9 members.

Was this item approved? Yes

What does this mean? The Birmingham Public Library Board will now have 9, instead of 10 members. This change will prevent a tie on matters the Board votes on. The President of the Friends of the Birmingham Public Library also sits on the board in an advisory, and non-voting capacity. The Birmingham City Council will continue to appoint all 9 members to the Board.

The Birmingham Public Library Board was established in 1913 to oversee the assets and operations of the Birmingham Public Library system. It was a successor to the Birmingham Public Library Association, organized in 1908.

3. A Resolution electing two (2) members to the Public Athletic, Cultural and Entertainment (PACE) Facilities Board, at the nomination of the Mayor, said terms expiring December 13, 2023.

Was this item approved? Yes

What does this mean? The Public Athletic, Cultural, and Entertainment Facilities Board of the City of Birmingham is a five-member board, formed as a public corporation, created by the City of Birmingham on August 9, 2011 to assume responsibility for the development of Regions Field and the Negro Southern League Museum adjoining Railroad Park in Birmingham's Parkside District. Three of the members of the PACE Board are appointed by the Mayor of Birmingham, and two are appointed by the City Council.

The most pressing reason for the new appointments, according to both the Council and the Mayor, is a locally owned restaurant that

has been trying to open in the Negro Southern League Museum. Because the restaurant is located within the boundaries of the stadium, the PACE board must first move for approval.

The Mayor's 3 appointments are:

Cora Corley, retired athletic administrator with the Birmingham City Schools

Ronnie Rice, managing attorney with Alexander Shunnarah, PC

James Sullivan, president of Central City neighborhood association and currently employed by Alabama Power Company

The Council's 2 appointments are:

Samuel Rumore Jr., an attorney, who previously served a several boards including the Birmingham Park and Recreation Board and Birmingham Public Library Board of Trustees.

Jestina Howard, special events manager at Birmingham Museum of Art, who serves as a junior board member of Hands On Birmingham.
